Albrecht Dürer

Born: 21 May 1471

<u>Died</u>: 6 April 1528

Style: Northern Renaissance

Dürer was a well renowned German artist of the Renaissance Period. He was a painter, engraver, mathematician and printmaker.

He painted altars, religious works and portraits but he was also known for his highly detailed etching and printmaking skills.

Dürer also wrote a series of books about geometry, perspective and proportions.

Albrecht Dürer used many layers of fine detailed strokes to create this realistic painting of a hare.

He signed his work using his unique mark that included the initials of his name:

Adoration of the Trinity

Medium: Oil on panel

<u>Dimensions</u>: 135 cm X 123.4 cm (53.15 X 48.58 in)

<u>Located</u>: Kunsthistorisches Museum, Vienna, Austria

Dürer made this altar piece for Matthaus Landauer who founded a home for old craftsman who had fallen on hard times. It was housed in the Chapel of All Saints, attached to the home.

Dürer painted the images on a wooden panel and he also carved the stand on which the altar piece stands. The altar piece now resides in the Kunsthistorisches Museum, Vienna, Austria.

Portrait Of A Clergyman

Completed: 1516

Medium: Oil on panel

<u>Dimensions</u>: 52.4 x 42.2 cm (20.63 X 16.61 in)

Located: National Gallery of Art, Washington DC, USA

The identity of the clergyman is uncertain, but is believed to be Johann Dorsch, the first protestant minister of Schwabach, near Nuremberg, Germany.
